Admission requirements

Applicants must pass an entrance examination to gain admission to study Cultural Anthropology. Students who have completed the shared Cultural Anthropology–Archaeology Basic Studies package may apply to study Cultural Anthropology as a major subject upon initiation of their Intermediate Studies. Students enrolled at the University of Oulu with some other subject as their major can apply for permission to study Cultural Anthropology as a subsidiary subject (minor) by addressing an informal motivational letter to the Professor of Cultural Anthropology before the entrance examination for new students in the spring. Students majoring in Archaeology, Saami Language or Saami Culture, however, are free to study Cultural Anthropology as a subsidiary subject without further application.

Cultural Anthropology

Cultural anthropology is a humanistic discipline focusing on culture. Cultural anthropology expressly studies people as cultural and social beings, as well as the lifestyles of individuals and groups of people. The ambition of cultural anthropology is to understand different cultures from their own perspective, and to learn how a person's cultural background affects their actions, thoughts and lives. Cultural anthropologists are interested in the unique characteristics that distinguish cultures from each other and the similarities different cultures share. Therefore, viewing matters from comparative perspectives is a common theme in the discipline. Cultural anthropology aims to understand and explain the characteristics of particular cultures, as well as the distinctions and similarities between them. Cultural anthropology is not a specific discipline in the sense that it does not focus on a specific area or tradition of cultural research; rather, cultural anthropology is a general term for research that aims to combine different approaches and perspectives. As a result, fairly diverse areas of research fall under the term cultural anthropology, e.g., ethno history, economic anthropology, visual anthropology, anthropology of religion, medical anthropology, anthropology of media and anthropology of education. The primary application of anthropological research is providing means to solve social issues.

Characteristic features of cultural anthropology include theory formation and use of a comparative approach to cultures. One of the functions of cultural anthropology is to broaden a person's outlook on differing cultures. In addition, the cultural anthropology studies at the University of Oulu are closely connected with archaeology, at the Basic Studies level. The Cultural Anthropology curriculum is designed to motivate students to perceive culture as a phenomenon that is connected to its context, is a result of historical development, and is constantly changing. Similarly, the aim of Cultural Anthropology is to develop students' ability to analyse the relation between the individual and culture. Independent fieldwork has a prominent position in Cultural Anthropology's research methodology, and

consequently, all students practise the technique during the different stages of their studies. The emphasis of the teaching and research at the University of Oulu lies on the northern cultures, the indigenous cultures of the Americas, and the modern phenomena of Western culture.

The departments of Cultural Anthropology and Archaeology arrange a common entrance examination each spring, and 20 new applicants are accepted as degree students every year. The students share the same Basic Studies package for both degree programmes, and later choose either Cultural Anthropology or Archaeology as their major subject at the beginning of their Intermediate level studies. Otherwise, students can freely choose their subsidiary subjects starting at the Basic Studies level.

Subsidiary subjects that are related to and benefit Cultural Anthropology studies are, for example, Archaeology, Museology, History, Art History, Cultural Geography, Psychology, Sociology and Women's Studies, but other humanistic and social science subjects are also preferable subsidiary subjects. To improve their employability, it is considered beneficial for students of Cultural Anthropology to study commercial studies, languages, computer science, tourism or health sciences, for instance. Cultural Anthropology is also a subsidiary subject that complements other humanistic studies and the studies in the natural, social or health sciences.

Employment prospects

Students graduating with a degree in Cultural Anthropology can utilize their education in the service of Finnish society in areas such as research, tourism, museums, the media, business and organizational activities. A background in cultural anthropology also prepares students for employment in international work, for example in the service of The Ministry for Foreign Affairs or international development organizations.

Practical information

All students must register at the Student Services Office. Students should update any changes in their contact information either at the Student Services Office or via WebOodi. The department publishes a new curriculum at the beginning of each term which can be found in the Cultural Studies office or on the Cultural Anthropology website (<u>http://www.oulu.fi/hutk/ka/opiskelu/opetusohjelma.html</u>). Information on important student happenings and events can also be found on the website and on the office's Cultural Anthropology bulletin board.

The teaching methods used for instruction are a combination of lectures, seminars, book exams and fieldwork exercises. Students of Cultural Anthropology begin their studies with the Introductory Course. Students can take exams on the dates set for the faculty examinations or on the degree group (Group II – Cultural Studies) exam dates.

Students may, in some circumstances, produce lecture diaries or home essays in place of the written examinations, but these options must be arranged with the examiner. In addition, some lectures arranged by other departments can be used to fulfil the study requirements of the Cultural Anthropology degree programme. When taking examinations, students should state the name and code of the course they wish to receive credit for and the number of ECTS credits it represents. University staff will enter credits for a passed course in the student's official transcript upon completion of studies. Students should check their records approximately every six months to make sure credits have been received and that it is up to date. The University stores the study results (i.e. exam papers/essays) for six months after the announcement of the results.

Study packages and learning outcomes

Upon completion of the Basic Studies package in Cultural Anthropology and Archaeology, students will be able to describe the history of the disciplines of archaeology and cultural anthropology, as well as the research methods and different theoretical bases the utilize. Students will know how to define the key concepts of archaeology and cultural anthropology, and will be able to describe the different fields of research. In addition, students will know how to explain the interaction between man and his surroundings over a long time perspective. Students will also be able to define the basic concepts of biological anthropology, and will know how to describe the bases of Finnish folklore.

Upon completion of the Intermediate Studies package in Cultural Anthropology, students will have acquired an understanding of the research methodologies and theoretical perspectives and trends in anthropology. Students will also be familiar with the central subfields of cultural anthropology. Students will be able to independently carry out small research projects based on ethnographic fieldwork. In addition, students will be able to converse and write in a manner befitting scholarly discourse.

Upon completion of the Advanced Studies package in Cultural Anthropology, students will be able to analyse the special characteristics relevant to an area of ethnography they choose to specialize in. Students will be able to separate different views of science, different theoretical and methodological research trends, and will also be able to implement their area of expertise regarding such views. Students will be able to construct a theoretically grounded

research frame and then answer the formulated research question. Students will be able to apply their studies of Cultural Anthropology in working life.
